State of Vermont Executive Department A Proclamation

WHEREAS,

it is estimated over 154,000 women in the United States have metastatic breast cancer, which is when cancer spreads beyond the breast to other parts of the body, including the bones, lungs, liver and brain; and

WHEREAS,

one in eight women in the United States could be diagnosed with breast cancer in their lifetime, and in Vermont, it is expected that 600 women will be diagnosed with breast cancer in 2018; and

WHEREAS,

in 2018, it is estimated more than 80 women in Vermont will die of breast cancer, nearly all due to metastatic breast cancer, cutting short the lives of too many and leaving a lasting effect on their families; and

WHEREAS,

the focus of breast cancer awareness is early detection and routine diagnosis, which has seen tremendous progress in the last 30 years; and

WHEREAS,

currently no cure exists for metastatic breast cancer, however there is reason to be hopeful, as extensive research efforts are underway to address this high, unmet need, and many of those with metastatic breast cancer continue treatment with the goal of extending the best quality life possible; and

WHEREAS,

metastatic breast cancer affects all races and socioeconomic classes, and while, Caucasian women see slightly higher incidence rates of breast cancer, the mortality rate for African-American women with breast cancer is 39 percent higher than Caucasian women, and breast cancer is the leading cause of cancer-related death for Hispanic women; and

WHEREAS,

any discussions of breast cancer should include the spectrum from screening through the treatment and support of those with metastatic breast cancer; and

WHEREAS,

https://ClinicalTrials.gov is a searchable database which provides patients, family members and the public with information about current ongoing clinical research studies; and

WHEREAS,

there is still more research to be done for metastatic breast cancer so that new and more effective treatments can be developed, and Vermont will continue to push for critical research and advanced treatments for metastatic breast cancer; and WHEREAS,

individuals diagnosed with metastatic breast cancer are encouraged to speak with their physician to learn more about the disease and find support groups and services in their community or online.
