Vermont acknowledges and condemns the legal, humanitarian, and WHEREAS,

> social harms imposed upon indigenous communities in the United States, including any of these harms suffered by the Abenaki

community in the land now known as Vermont; and

after decades of advocacy, the Abenaki communities successfully WHEREAS,

> gained State recognition as Native American Indian tribes in 2010, with the signing of Act No. 107 of 2010, An Act Relating to State

Recognition of Native American Indian tribes in Vermont; and

today, the rich legacy of the Abenaki is celebrated through arts and WHEREAS,

> cultural offerings, as well as through state and local policy that aims to address the needs and challenges of the Abenaki community in

Vermont: and

WHEREAS, there are now four State-recognized Native American Indian tribes

> in Vermont: the Elnu Abenaki tribe; the Nulhegan band of the Coosuk Abenaki Nation; the Koasek Abenaki of the Koas; and the

Missisquoi, St. Francis-Sokoki band; and

through mutual honor and respect for the rich heritage of the state's WHEREAS,

indigenous people, this week we honor the centuries-old culture and

traditions of Vermont's Abenaki communities.
