## State of Vermont Executive Department A Proclamation

WHEREAS, November 2022 is recognized as National Native American Heritage Month

and offers the opportunity to recognize Indigenous peoples in Vermont and

across the country; and

WHEREAS, Vermont recognizes it was founded and built upon N'dakina, the ancestorial

lands first inhabited and stewarded by Indigenous peoples of this region – the Abenaki, the Pennacook, and the Mohican – and acknowledges and honors

these members of the community; and

**WHEREAS,** through Act R-114 of 2021, the Vermont Legislature formally apologized and

expressed sorrow for Vermont's historic support and participation in eugenics

policies and practices against Indigenous people; and

**WHEREAS,** by acknowledging historical harm, the state has taken an important first step

towards restorative justice, yet there is still work to be done to move towards

justice for Indigenous communities; and

WHEREAS, Vermont recognizes the historic, cultural, and contemporary significance of

Indigenous peoples of the lands that also became known as the Americas; and

**WHEREAS**, Vermont is committed to ensuring equity for Indigenous peoples in our state;

and

WHEREAS, Vermont acknowledges the many practices which come from Indigenous

teachings including fire management, crop rotation and maple sugaring; and

**WHEREAS,** the Abenaki have called these lands home for thousands of years, and today

Vermont is also proud to have Indigenous people in Vermont from tribes with

roots all around the country.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Philip B. Scott, Governor, hereby proclaim November 2022 as

## NATIVE AMERICAN HERITAGE MONTH

in Vermont.
