A Proclamation

WHEREAS, children, Vermont's most precious resource, must be guaranteed their health, well-being and protection; and

WHEREAS, of the 876 substantiated child abuse incidents in Vermont in 2017, 37 percent were related to sexual abuse and 16 percent to physical abuse; and

WHEREAS, to protect children who have been abused, firm action is needed by Vermont's judicial system, the Vermont Department for Children and Families and Vermont's Child Advocacy Centers, supplemented by continued engagement of early intervention programs and initiatives, such as: Circle of Parents®, home visitation, Early Essential Education, SAFE-T, Care for Kids, Youth Services, We Care Elementary, KidSafe Collaborative, Commit to Kids, Strengthening Families Framework, quality child care and the Nurturing Parenting Programs®; and

WHEREAS, all forms of child abuse, sexual, physical, emotional, and neglect, can lead to physical and behavioral health problems including heart disease, cancer, high blood pressure, obesity, substance abuse and incarceration which inevitably affects our families, schools, communities and health care systems; and

WHEREAS, parents, foster parents, child care professionals, social workers, health and mental health professionals, educators, law enforcement officers, victim advocates, home visitors, parent educators, domestic violence and rape crisis workers, hotline workers, mentors, guardian ad litem and other volunteers demonstrate a daily commitment to children and families who fall prey to violence.


NOW, THEREFORE, I, Philip B. Scott, Governor, hereby proclaim April 2019 as


CHILD ABUSE PREVENTION MONTH
