## State of Vermont Executive Department A Proclamation

WHEREAS, every person is endowed with human dignity and value, and redemption and second

chances are Vermont values; and

WHEREAS, individuals returning to Vermont's communities from prison often face barriers to

finding housing and employment as well as educational opportunities, also known as

collateral consequences; and

WHEREAS, the Council of State Governments reports that the number of legal collateral

consequences of a criminal conviction exceeds 44,000, including 319 unique to

Vermont; and

**WHEREAS**, in its vigorous pursuit to offer offenders, particularly young offenders, second chances

and reduced collateral consequences, Vermont has robust systems of pre-trial and post-conviction diversion programming, deferred sentencing, juvenile justice

initiatives and expungement and sealing laws; and

WHEREAS, we can always do better by reviewing those collateral consequences unique to

Vermont and determining if, as a policy matter, they remain appropriate; and

WHEREAS, it is essential that Vermont's policy-makers provide the needed resources for

successful reintegration of those returning to Vermont's communities from prison such as appropriate transitional housing and services, including mental health and substance misuse treatment, long-term affordable housing, appropriate training and

tools for workforce development and equitable educational opportunities; and

**WHEREAS,** the anniversary of the death of Charles Colson, who used his second chance following

his incarceration for a Watergate-related crime to found Prison Fellowship, the

nation's largest outreach to prisoners and their families, falls on April 21st; and

**WHEREAS**, a robust coalition of businesses, congregations, and other organizations across the

country has celebrated Second Chance Month since April 2017 through prayer walks, Second Chance Sunday services, briefings, social media campaigns, advocacy, press,

Second Chance 5ks, and other events and activities; and

WHEREAS, the designation of April as Second Chance Month would contribute to increased

public awareness about the need for opportunities for individuals, employers,

congregations, and communities to extend second chances.

**NOW, THEREFORE,** I, Philip B. Scott, Governor, hereby proclaim April 2022 as

## SECOND CHANCE MONTH

in Vermont.
