> celebrate the heritage and the many contributions of the Abenaki to present-day Vermont, New Hampshire, Maine and New York; and

WHEREAS, Vermont acknowledges and condemns the legal, humanitarian, and

social harms imposed upon the Abenaki community in the land now known as Vermont, as well as those harms suffered by the

Indigenous communities in the United States; and

WHEREAS, after decades of advocacy, the Abenaki communities in Vermont

> successfully gained State recognition as Native American Indian tribes in 2010, with the signing of Act No 107 of 2010, an act relating to state recognition of Native American Indian tribes in

Vermont; and

WHEREAS, there are now four State-recognized Native American Indian tribes

> in Vermont: the Elnu Abenaki tribe; the Nulhegan band of the Coosuk Abenaki Nation; the Koasek Abenaki of the Koas; and the

Missisquoi, St. Francis-Sokoki band; and

today, the rich legacy of the Abenaki is celebrated through arts and WHEREAS,

> cultural offerings, as well as through state and local policy that aims to address the needs and challenges of the Abenaki community in Vermont, including Abenaki people not affiliated with State-

recognized Native American Indian tribes: and

WHEREAS, through mutual honor and respect for the rich heritage of the state's

Indigenous people, this week we honor the culture and traditions of

Vermont's Abenaki communities.
