War battle fought entirely on what would become Vermont soil; and

WHEREAS, although technically a British victory, the Battle of Hubbardton is considered one of

the most successful rear-guard actions in American history and a strategic victory

for the Americans in the Northern Campaign of 1777; and

the marble monument placed on the battlefield in 1859 is one of the oldest WHEREAS,

> Revolutionary War battle monuments in the United States, and the creation of Hubbardton Battlefield was one of the earliest attempts to preserve and commemorate a Revolutionary War site, initiated by local veterans and witnesses to

the event in 1777; and

the State of Vermont's Division for Historic Preservation has owned and stewarded WHEREAS,

the Hubbardton Battlefield state historic site since 1937; and

WHEREAS, the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, whose mission is to

> promote historic preservation, education, and patriotism, are placing commemorative markers in every state of our nation to honor the men and women

who achieved American independence; and

WHEREAS. the sacrifices of those who fought and died at the Battle of Hubbardton are not

forgotten and are a reminder of the lengths Americans have gone to preserve our

freedoms.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Philip B. Scott, Governor, hereby proclaim July 7, 2023 as
