## State of Vermont Executive Department A Proclamation

WHEREAS, Vermont saw a 3.3% decrease in the number of fatal opioid overdoses between 2022

and 2023; and

WHEREAS, 236 Vermont residents lost their lives to overdose in 2023, marking a decrease from

2022 as the highest number of fatal opioid overdoses to date; and

WHEREAS, 65 Vermonters have lost their life to an opioid overdose as of May within 2024; and

WHEREAS, a rapidly changing and increasingly toxic drug supply, including non-opioid

adulterants that do not respond to overdose reversal tools like naloxone, continues to

challenge efforts to combat overdoses in our state; and

**WHEREAS.** substance use disorder is a disease and should be addressed as a medical condition;

and

WHEREAS, Vermonters experiencing opioid use disorder continue to face stigma which can be

a barrier to reaching out for potentially life-saving harm reduction, treatment, or

recovery services; and

WHEREAS, raising awareness about substance use disorder combats stigma and promotes health;

and

WHEREAS, harm reduction, treatment, and recovery partners in Vermont continue to support the

health of Vermonters in reducing their risk of overdose and provided continuous

service despite the pandemic and recent natural disaster that hit our state; and

WHEREAS, government and public health leaders continue to increase investments in harm

reduction, prevention, treatment, and recovery resources to strengthen and save lives;

and

**WHEREAS**, awareness about the crisis in overdoses and deaths helps empower every Vermonter

to be a knowledgeable, active participant and potential life saver should they

encounter someone in distress.

**NOW, THEREFORE,** I, Philip B. Scott, Governor, hereby proclaim August 31, 2024, as
