Across America Day" to be celebrated annually; and

WHEREAS, the mission of Wreaths Across America is to remember the fallen, honor those who

serve, and teach the next generation the value of freedom; and

WHEREAS, today the ceremony is celebrated on a mid-Saturday of December and encompasses

more than 4,600 locations in all 50 states, including Vermont, at sea and abroad, to

honor veterans from as far back as the Revolutionary War.
